The following expertise dated Milan, March 3, 1956, was written by Dr. Antonio Morassi (translation from the Italian):

"I have examined with the greatest of interest the Harem Scene you showed me at Zurich the other day, and I am glad to inform you that it is without any doubt a work of Francesco Guardi, of the very highest quality.

"The painting (canvas, $43 \times 60 \text{ cm.}$) is part of a series of scenes of Oriental life and customs that Guardi painted at a relatively early period, which can be dated as about 1735-50; his inspiration was probably drawings or prints of the time. -- In this series there are known two "harem interiors" in the collection of Count Cini at Venice, one in Paris, another at Milan, still another in Germany, all in private collections. I published the Paris picture in Emporium, November 1951.1

"The canvas I have just examined is one of the most admirable of all these, both for the delicacy of the transparent blue tonality and for the exquisite brilliant spirited touch."
